For five days, Helen and other members of her family stayed by Kylie's side night and day. On the fifth day, they received the news that a heart had become available.

That good news was not without some sadness. Helen hopes someday to meet the parents of

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the baby who turned their tragedy into a blessing for Kylie. "I would hug them," she says. "Then I would just stand there and cry. There is no language to express how grateful I feel."

Kylie received her new heart on December 1st, 1996, a day Kylie's family celebrates every year in honor of her heart donor. She excelled in school, rode her bike too fast, and even learned Tae Kwon Do.
